### ACCOLADES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

K J Somaiya college of science and commerce shines in the Atal Rankings

K J Somaiya college of science and commerce Vidyavihar Mumbai, (ARI-C-33631)has been placed under 'Band-Performer' in the category of General (Non-Technical)' in ARIIA Rankings 2021.

The Atal Ranking of Institutions on Innovation Achievements (ARIIA) is an initiative of the Ministry of Education (MoE), Government of India implemented through AICTE and MoE's Innovation Cell to systematically rank all major higher educational institutions and universities in India on indicators related to promotion and support of 'Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development' amongst students and faculties.

In this edition of ARIIA, MoE has divided the ranking into four categories (Band-Excellent, Band-Performer, Band-Promising, and Band-Beginner).

The Minister of State for Education, Shri Subhas Sarkar announced the ARIIA 2021 results on 29 December 2021. A total of 1438 institutions (including all IITs, NITs, IISc, etc.) participated in ARIIA 2021 rankings which is more than double as compared to second edition of ARIIA (2020). 674 institutes had participated in ARIIA 2020 and 496 institutes had participated in ARIIA 2019.

The First Prize in the World Wetland Day for his work on Mangrove Diversity; an award from Third International Conference "Green Health"; the Science Popularization program conducted by TIFR has appreciated his contribution, *He displayed* 

passionate zeal while helping disseminate scientific content says the commendation letter. He was an active participant in the joint research project on Air Quality between San Diego State University and K J Somaiya College of Science and Commerce.

But Rupesh's mettle was rigorously tested when the pandemic ravaged the world. And he took up the challenge of working in the hotspot of the pandemic – Dharavi, Mumbai. When some of the regular workers tested positive, Rupesh and his team from MCGM, stepped in to fill the resource crunch.


They became the warriors on the ground in what is now famously known as the "The Dharavi Model". An action plan that was lauded by WHO and BBC and was replicated in various other places.

During the lockdown Rupesh and his team helped to arrange food and groceries, arranged train journeys for migrant workers and buses to transport them to the train terminus. During Ramzan they conducted a special drive to organize dry fruits for worshippers.

Mr. Kiran Dighavkar, Asst. Commissioner of MCGM appreciated Rupesh's efforts in the war against the pandemic, in the campaign known as Mission Dharavi.




